# RVUUF Congregational Discussions 2018 – 2019 Report

# Introduction

Our dedicated congregation sat down together in February to share ideas and aspirations for RVUUF's future. This was the second in our series of discussions about how we want to grow as a group of people striving to live in principles that unite us as a church community. The group discussions took place on February 24, 2019 after the regular Sunday service. As with the first session in November, we had 6 groups hosted by a facilitator and scribe. The groups were spread out in and around the Great Hall and Emerson House.

Each group utilized a standard format. This included **Welcome and Introductions** followed by sharing background on why we are holding these aspiring discussions:

*Our congregation is in the last year of our 5 year developmental goal cycle. It is time to begin envisioning and setting priorities for the coming years.* 

In working to build a leadership team, the Board, CFM and Minister hope to have a dynamic where roles, responsibilities, authority and accountability are clear in governance and ministry. We will keep you posted about our research on models of church leadership.

The facilitators prepared each group by asking that we strive to share our ideas in the context of our covenant and using compassion as our guide.

Two principle questions were posed to the group and everyone was invited to reflect and share in the conversation.

- 1st Question: What does Lifespan Learning or Faith Formation mean to you and how does it tie into our commitment to the RVUUF mission?
- 2nd Question: What do you see in 2025 as you look into the future of RVUUF? What do you want to strengthen, to hope for, or envision for the learning program at RVUUF?

# **Group Minutes**

Tables on pages 3-6 offer a synopsis of responses provided by each group. As much as possible duplicates within each group were deleted unless it was not possible to do this because it would not reflect the spirit of the input. Duplicates between groups were not removed so as to show commonalities. Repetitions within groups are noted with a star ( $\bigstar$ ). Here is a short description of each group:

### Evaluation:

Question sheets were handed out to participants at the end of discussions. Many were collected and some of the responses are noted here.

- People excited about mix of ages in their groups
- People committed to taking up certain tasks
- o People want to grow the youth program and inter-generational activities
- o Positive comments about our minister
- o Concern about not having facility to accommodate larger programs
- o College students looking for ways to make connections
- RE teachers want to work more on programs
- People want to be more informed on what is happening; this connects with CFM work on how to best communicate with congregation

#### Group 1:

- $\star$  classes and projects for all ages, e.g., Sign Language
- projects for kids: intention for a day; lollipops sold before, money used to buy yarn for knitters to make hats for kids
- RE Parents craving classes, like Cat Cox
- Druid class; in past by Vern Crawford
- activities needed in Talent
- ★ recorded many RVUUF elders, in open-ended interviews, in RVUUF Library on DVD. Might be time to resume this again; might show DVDs in evenings or afternoons, grandparents' day or Ancestors service?
- ★ learn about other cultures, UU opportunities and religions
- Make Your Own Religion (other title?)
- program where retired school buses make a home for family with at least 1 child, need a place for it to reside
- ★ meditation for adults not during work hours; introduce kids, too; RVUUF Sangha could share and meet 1 on 1 or in group
- meditation introduced to children in RE
- ★ outdoor activities and outings for kids: skiing, skating, zip-lining, karaoke, dog party, movies, games; how to connect adults who could take kids to these activities?
- make board game called "Random Acts of Kindness"; could be all age project; sell at UUA bookstore; example of project by kids and their community
- RVUUF has great bicycling group
- felting class
- feel supported at RVUUF even if we make mistakes and as we learn new things; enjoy learning new things and OLLI
- ★ have RVUUF groups join for community projects; kids could make toys, set up backpacks for needy kids
- let people know the projects we are doing

Group 2:

- opportunity to keep growing; needs to be different than what is already available to meet needs
- Ideas aging ie. services available, activities for parents and children. The fun committee educates us for fun and laughter. It provides an opportunity to keep learning – from young to old
- expose children to non-violent communication (Rosenberg); learn how to relate to one another.
- includes coming to the services on Sunday, singing, practicing social skills. A place where transgender people can be accepted and learn to have a healthy lifestyle
- learning how to raise my child as a UU. No rituals for daily life to integrate identity
- we don't need additional activities; already have numerous groups, e.g., Buddhists, etc.
- Group activities are different from classes.
- UU too focused on human communication – need to focus more on individual experiences such as solitude, meditation. Help us to value and use our inner resources
- focus more on the natural world. We are too anthropocentric. More environmental experiences

Group 3:

- notion of humanism; came to learn more about diff world religions and ideologies, concepts, and how I could incorporate into my own life
- poet, lectures, people from diff. backgrounds. people my age are looking for this kind of experience, and don't know about UU, maybe more outreach to SOU
- I like UU goals; embrace diversity includes the essence of what we find in many religions
- cultural stagnation is a problem of religion, the task of spirituality is to disrobe that, UU offers a way forward
- expose kids to religious diversity, values of love, forgiveness. I love what you're doing with them, shaping their future
- try to be inclusive. I'm searching for a faith, why are there not more minorities? All UU churches are like this, even the big Portland church, UUs have work to do, goals to achieve.
- ★ look at how to be more present in RVUUF and the community. Took BYOT yrs. ago, interesting, helpful, want us to do it again, esp. for people looking to understand their belief system
- excited about this fellowship and our potential to bring more love into the world
- like BYOT idea. I struggle with diversity. For whom? So UU's can feel good about ourselves?
- don't have a lot to say about lifespan learning
- need younger people
- Race is an Ashland issue, I miss tapestry of Oakland, but living here is wonderful
